A Prayer before Communion

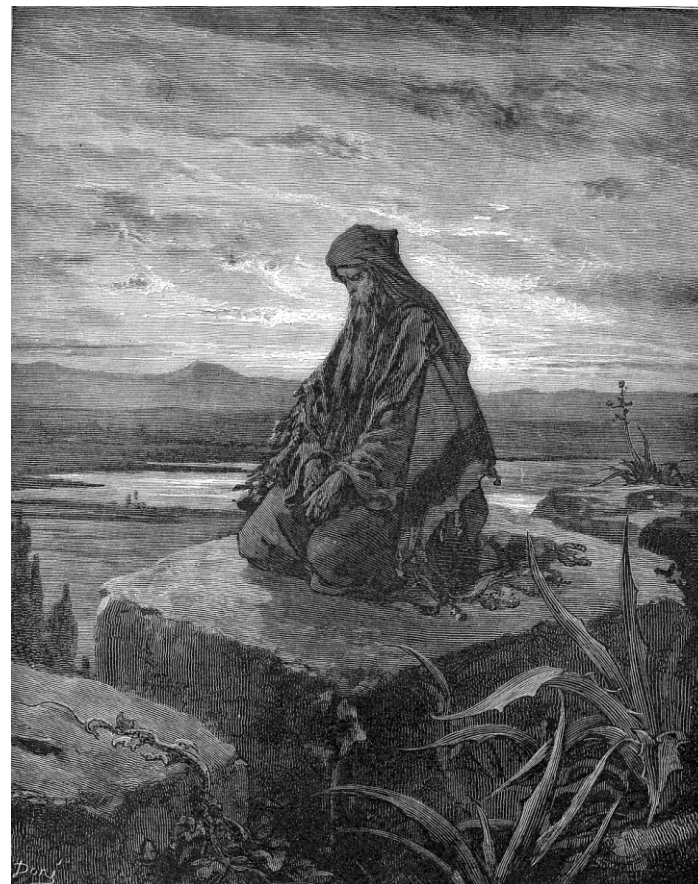

The first is God's promise, which is the chief thing and is the foundation and power of all prayers. ...The second requisite of true prayer, following that of God's promise, is faith—that we believe the promise is true, and do not doubt that God will give what He promises. ...The third requisite of true prayer is, that one must name definitely something that he brings to God or for which he prays; as for strong faith, for love, for peace, and for the comfort of his
